

Welcome to the world of cinquains!

A cinquain [sɪŋˈkeɪn] is a short poem consisting of five, usually unrhymed lines, it has 2 syllables in the first line, 4 in the second, 6 in the third, 8 in the fourth line, and just 2 in the last line.

The cinquain was invented by American poet Adelaide Crapsey about 100 years ago. It is like the Japanese haiku and tanka. The word "cinquain" comes from the Latin root for "five".





A girl, Friendly, happy, Walks, talks, works. She has so many duties, Me.





The sun,
Hot and bright,

Warms, shines, sparks.

One can lie on the beach,

Sunny.

Nowadays one of the most popular variations of cinquains is a didactic cinquain. It is widely taught at schools of the UK and the USA.

Its structure:

Line 1 – one word (a noun);

Line 2 – two words (adjectives);

Line 3 – three words (action verbs);

Line 4 – four words (feelings);

Line 5 – one word (a synonym of line 1).

For example:

Baimak
Wonderful, young
Grows, learns to live, helps me
It is my little native town
My home
